

Diversity, Equity, Inclusion (DEI)

We are committed to building a more diverse, equitable and inclusive team with a wide range of experiences and talents and supporting a culture of belonging. In 2023 we continued to make progress on our multi-year DEI action plan, including the following focus areas:

Supplier/Vendor Diversity

Associates connected with local underrepresented contractors, including hiring as many M/WBE certified subcontractors as possible for The Darby at Briarcliff in Kansas City.

Associates worked on a data repository and reporting system to understand our supplier diversity and help those sourcing suppliers to expand the reach of their searches with opportunities to work together.

Associate Recruitment & Hiring Focus

We've formed partnerships with diverse student organizations at some of the universities from which we attend career fairs.

We sponsored the Construction Management Women's Association (CMWA) at Minnesota State University – Mankato's Brunch & Learn event in March, and Beth Duyvejonck, Regional Vice President of Construction, was the event's keynote speaker.

We launched the <u>Open Doors Internship</u> to introduce younger students who may have had less access or exposure to careers in the industry.

Support External Community Building

We were an ambassador sponsor for the third annual Construction Inclusion Week.

Kristin Ridley, Executive Director of the Opus Foundation, led a panel discussion with two nonprofit partners prioritizing racial equity work during the regular Minneapolis DEI Team Building event in October.

Beth Duyvejonck delivered the <u>Kate Dunwoody</u> Society Luncheon Keynote on Gender Equity.

Senior Leadership Engagement

Our Executive Leadership Team kept DEI as a standing agenda item in their bi-weekly meetings.

In July, senior leaders gathered for a two-day DEI workshop.

The Executive Leadership Team and senior leaders participated in quarterly DEI learning sessions to expand understanding and capacity.

Policy Equity Focus Area

A task force reviewed several policies, identifying and implementing changes in some.

An inclusive meeting and event preparation guide was created to ensure best practices are followed.

Our construction group has worked towards using more inclusive language. Foreman was removed from our standard job titles. Associates previously known as General Foreman are now Field Supervisors.

Education & Culture Building

We held our first annual <u>Be Better Together Week</u>, which was an opportunity for our associates to come together to learn about building belonging and inclusion.

We launched the <u>Building Culture Book Club</u>, fostering courageous conversations across the organization.

Opus Women's Network, our longest existing Associate Resource Group, has continued making an impact and advocating for women.


